Some historians credit Francis Hopkinson, a New Jersey delegate to the Continental Congress, with designing the first flag in 1702.

The Stars and Stripes History:




The colors of the U.S. flag are full of meaning. **Red** stands for bravery and strength, **white** represents purity and innocence, and **blue** symbolizes justice and perseverance. The Stars and Stripes remind Americans of the sacrifices made to build and protect the country. It flies proudly over schools, government buildings, and homes, and is displayed during important national holidays like Independence Day, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day.

The Lone Star: Texas Pride

The **Lone Star Flag** belongs to the state of **Texas**. It was adopted as the official state flag in **1839**, when Texas was still an independent country known as the **Republic of Texas**. The single white star on the flag became such an important symbol that Texas is still called "**The Lone Star State**."





The original design for the Republic of Texas flag by Peter Krag, the design was approved on January 25, 1839, and signed by Mirabeau Lamar, President of the Republic of Texas.

The flag has three main parts: a **blue vertical stripe** with a single white star on the left, and two horizontal bars—**white on top** and **red on the bottom**. Each color has a special meaning too. **Blue** stands for loyalty, **white** for purity, and **red** for bravery. The single star represents unity as one state and independence from other nations. Texans take great pride in this flag because it reminds them of their unique history and their time as an independent republic before joining the United States in **1845**.

The Lone Star Flag is more than just a state symbol—it represents Texas's bold and independent spirit. Whether it's seen flying over the Texas State Capitol in Austin, at a school, or at a football game, it reminds Texans of their identity and strength.

Similarities Between the Two Flags
