Abstract: Arlene Vojtek

Arlene Uherek Vojtek was born in 1938 in Needville where her dad was Foreman on the Oak Tree Ranch. She provides some detailed observations of growing up in small towns such as Needville and Rosenberg. Her husband, Frank, spent 30 years as a driver and salesman for the beer industry. Together they raised 2 children, a son with cerebral palsy and mental retardation who Arlene still cares for today and a daughter who resides nearby.

Born into a Czech heritage, she was able to speak to her grandparents who only spoke Czech. Today, she still remembers a little of that language and tries to carry on some of the traditions.
