# Abstract: Bernice A. Freudensprung

Born in Frenstat, Texas, in 1936 from Czech background, Bernice Ubernosky Freudensprung provides a few stories of growing up on a small farm with 6 siblings without electricity or a phone; taking the train into Rosenberg and Houston; and, going to dances. Bernice spoke fluent Czech with her grandmother but over time lost her ancestral language. She and her husband raised 3 children and she worked for the school district in food services.
