Stephen F. Austin acquired the original 5 leagues of land from Mexico in 1823 that eventually became the City of Sugar Land, the subdivision called New Territory, and Cee Cee and David Parker's Hidden Territory Farm.

The Parker's have compiled extensive research and documents detailing the ownership of the lands dating back to 1823, including their 31 acres which they purchased in 2006.

The Parker's ownership joins the land's historical owners including Spain, Mexico, Austin, Cartwright, Thompson, and Gless.
