Abstract: CHARLIE MORGAN

Charlie Morgan, a very proud fifth generation Texan born at home in Monaville in 1926, provides interesting tidbits about raising cattle not only in Texas but around the world. Mr. Morgan spent 34 years managing the Bar C ranches. He traveled extensively to Europe, and South and North America to purchase cattle, share breeding ideas and provide expert advice.

Charlie was a lifetime member of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and helped many young men and women attain scholarships. He was passionate about ranching. He was a director of the National Charolais Association, Past President of the Texas Charolais as well as Ambassador to South and Central America through the United States Agriculture Department, judging that countries cattle. He is in the Charolais Association Hall of Fame and was enshrined into the Who's Who of Agriculture Genetics in Washington DC.

Charlie proudly served our country in the United States Navy. He was in charge of the fire fighters during WWII, on the USS Bexar. As a veteran he was passionate about honoring Fallen War Heroes, and was actively working to have a Veterans Wall of Honor erected at the Waller County Courthouse to honor all of the Fallen Heroes of Waller County.

He and his wife Catherine raised three children in Fort Bend while both were involved in various organizations in the county and around the state.

Born at home in Monaville 10/03/1926.

Spent 34 years managing the extensive ranching operations called the Bar C.

His family came to Texas in 1833 from Selma AL.

He was one of 9 children.

Raised in Monaville on his parent's ranch among a tight knit community.

Entered the Navy at age 18 in 1945 without graduating from high school.

Simonton/Fulshear/Brookshire had very rich soil and was known as the River Oaks of the pure bred cattle business.

Houston Livestock Show played a huge part in promoting improved breeds of cattle.

Fort Bend and Waller counties was home to large pure bred cattle ranches.

Luling, TX had a gain test station that tested and promoted better breeding concepts.

An officer in the Texas, American and International Associations of Charolais and Charbray cattle.

Served as a judge and adviser in various countries in Europe and the Americas

Wife Catherine involved with the Girl Scout program. They raised 3 kids.

Inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1995 as one of North America's outstanding breeders of Charolais cattle.
