Abstract: Hattie Mae Branch Bailey

She tells of her life experiences, including life without washing machines, electric irons, electric or gas stoves, running water, electric lights or refrigerators. She describes farming techniques in the days before tractors. Ms. Hattie escorted Ms. Janie Wessendorff, who was blind, from a burning house in 1965, and describes this event.
