Abstract: Leslie Armin "Buddy" Wheeler III

Buddy Wheeler was born and raised in Sugar Land, Texas, when it was still a "company town," owned and controlled by Imperial Sugar Company. In that era, Buddy's life revolved around the outdoors, fishing and hunting, and exploring the Gulf Coast; which led to his role as a founding member of Coastal Conservation Association in 1977, an influential ecological organization.

Buddy comes from a long line of dentists in the family. His father L. A. Wheeler II graduated from the University of Texas Dental School and was hired by Dr. Slaughter to be the dentist for the Imperial Sugar Company. His mother, Maxine, was a nurse at Laura Eldridge Memorial Hospital and was known for her sewing and creating wedding dresses.

Buddy reminisces about growing up in the small company town and attending the local schools. He was the last senior to graduate from Sugar Land High School in 1959. Buddy shares many stories about fishing along the Gulf Coast including night fishing.

Buddy married and then graduated from dental school in 1965. He partnered with his dad in their dental practice in Sugar Land. He also received 8 years of advanced training in rehabilitation dentistry.

Buddy Wheeler was born in 1941 and followed in the footsteps of the men in his family by becoming a dentist. His grandfather, father and uncle were all dentists in Texas. After graduation from dental school in 1965, he joined his father in the dental practice in Sugar Land after much research.

Buddy and his family enjoyed camping and fishing in Chinquapin before it was destroyed by Hurricane Carla in 1961. He also was active in Boy Scouts and liked to hunt and eat rabbit and squirrel.

Buddy and his wife Toni married in 1964 and raised their 2 daughters in Sugar Land. He was active in the startup of the Gulf Coast Conservation Association to save the redfish and other aquatic animals from over-fishing.

Retired, he still likes to fish and enjoys his 7 grandchildren.
