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Abstract: René Rosenbush Lamb

Mrs. Lamb's ancestors, John and Randolph Foster, came to Texas in 1822 as members of Austin's Old 300. Her grandmother, Hallie Rosenbush inherited a portion of the Foster land located on FM 359. Her family comes from a long line of farmers and ranchers in the Foster and Simonton areas. There is now a school named after the Fosters and a state marker.

Pecan harvesting was a fun time because everyone helped and the kids received a silver dollar for picking up and bagging the pecans. Her mother had a large vegetable garden and canned the produce for later use. Ms. Lamb was a teacher and counselor during her working career. Her husband, Chuck, owned the well-known Austin Outhouse bar in Austin for about 30 years.

René Lamb was born in 1947 in Houston but was raised in Fort Bend County.

She comes from distinguished members of Austin's Old 300 – John and Randolph Foster. Between them they owned over 16,000 acres of prime farm and ranch land. Upon their deaths, the land was divided among descendants, including René's grandmother, Hallie Rosenbush.

René shares her memories of growing up in Foster, attending school, being involved in many school activities and having lots of cousins around especially during pecan season.

Mrs. Lamb was a teacher and counselor during her entire career at various Texas school districts. She retired from Fort Bend ISD.

Her husband, Chuck, owned The Austin Outhouse, a well-known bar and popular music venue in Austin, Texas, for almost 30 years.

René is a member of the Fort Bend County Historical Commission (FBCHC) and in 2013 she received the FBCHC Heritage Award.
