#### **Events**

Jean moved to Fort Bend County with her family in 1959.

Jean recalled her children playing most of the day in the farmland surrounding them "in the day". The boys would be gone all day without her worrying about them. But it's a way of life that's gone now. Her grown children with families are more watchful of their children nowadays out of necessity.

She doesn't recall any issues with segregation in Stafford in the 1960s and never felt deprived of medical care for herself or her family.
