Abstract: Sidney Mellon

Born in 1949, Sidney and his brother and sister lived in Fort Bend County where their parents owned a grocery store for 30 years.

Sidney describes an average day of school and working in the store. His parents owned a cattle ranch near Booth, Texas. After his father died, his mother went into the real estate business and started the Fort Bend Board of Realtors.

Sidney and his brother, a well-respected photographer, own K&M Homebuilders in Houston.

His sister, Rochelle, and her husband owned a horse ranch in California where they also worked for a movie studio. After his death, Rochelle moved back to Houston to care for her ailing mother.
